Service Area:	Butte County
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Program Philosophy
The early years of a child’s life are critical for optimal development and provide the foundation for success in life and school. Parents and caregivers are their children’s first and most influential teachers. All families with young children deserve the same opportunities to thrive, regardless of demographic, geographic, or economic considerations. The California Home Visiting Program (CHVP) offers families non-judgmental, culturally responsive, and non-stigmatizing support services that enable families to set and achieve their self-identified goals.

Program Goal
Promote optimal child early development, learning, and health by supporting and engaging parents and caregivers in accessing needed resources, ensuring positive parental mental health, creating healthy bonding, attunement, and attachment, increasing knowledge of child development, and building parenting skills.

Program Description	
Service Type:	Crisis and needs assessment, functional and developmental assessments, parent-child activities, parenting skills, access to community resources, and child development.
Service Location:	Various locations that meet the unique needs of families. Sites may include the home, neutral community locations, parks, hospitals, jail, on-site at Child Welfare, during supervised visits, schools, or other locations identified by the family as optimal to meet their needs.

Population Served:	Butte County families having children 0-3. Referrals include self-referral, community partners, hospitals and medical providers, and public agencies.
Hours of Operation:	Monday – Friday, 7:30 am to 6:30 pm. Saturday hours available on a case-by-case basis, as needed.

Service Abstract
CHVP provides a wide range of individualized family support services including, but not limited to--crisis assessment, needs assessment, safety assessment and planning, case planning and coordination, in-home and community visits, family activities, parenting and child development one-on-one or small

groups, individualized family service plans, links and warm connections to resources, assistance with accessing concrete needs, support to maintain housing and utilities, assistance to establish a medical and dental home, family function assessments, food security assessments, mental health status assessments, child behavioral support, coaching to increase service utilization, links to literacy activities, follow-up to ensure service reception and satisfaction, child developmental assessments, advocacy during child and family team meetings, and transition planning for case closure. Parents as Teachers certified CHVP home visitors provide individualized support based on family-identified priorities and goals. The program maintains strong community relationships with other service providers to ensure service non-duplication and seamless resource access.

Entry and Exit Criteria

CHVP accepts general referrals for families living in Butte County having children 0-3—referral sources include self-referral, friend referral, community partners, hospitals and medical providers, public agencies, and community partners. CHVP services are voluntary. Families may enter and exit services at their discretion. Once enrolled, families may participate for up to two years.

Referral, Transition, and Discharge

Referrals are accepted from any entity. Engagement, transition, and exit decisions are made by each family—the program is voluntary, and participation is not mandated. Transition and exit planning occur throughout service support and family exit includes a summary of services provided, connections/linkages made with services that will promote family stability, status of support network, recommendations for additional services or support, resources provided at exit, and recommendations for any follow-up, if applicable.
